
For your convenience, we do have a flyer accompanying this publication stating the scheduled chronology of events. Therefore, I'll not repeat this information but do want to share a few words with you regarding some thank yous, planning details, etc.:

- * Many thanks to Robert Frizzell. Mr. Frizzell is the current Library Director at Northwest Missouri State University. He wrote an article sometime back about the Confederate raids on the German communities at Concordia and Emma. Robert very kindly shared information about these conflicts and referred me to Donald Dittmer of Concordia, for help in telling the story there. Mr. Frizzell may participate in the tour.
- * Many thanks to Donald Dittmer. Donald, along with Robert Frizzell, is a descendent of the German Americans who were attacked by Dave Poole (my ancestor), and guerrilla friends. Mr. Dittmer has agreed to provide color commentary to our tour in Emma and Concordia by showing us points of interest, including the "killed by rebels" tombstones.
- * Many thanks to Bob Owens. Bob, will be our tour guide in Cole Camp. As you will recall, Bob provided the great Cole Camp Round Table presentation we had a few months back. He has graciously made our reservations at the Der Essen Platz restaurant, arranged our entrance onto the grounds of the Heisterberg and Harms farms (Battle of Cole Camp site), and will help us retrace the steps of the Confederate route into Cole Camp from Warsaw.
- * Many thanks to Jean Warren, of James Country Mercantile, Inc. Jean, a long-time reenactor and sutler of Civil War goods and supplies, has a great interest in early German settlement in Missouri. While she will be unable to attend the tour, she will be there in spirit. Last year, she purchased a CDV of Herman and Meta Heimsoth of Benton County (Cole Camp's county), as well as obtaining a good deal of that family's history. Mr. Heimsoth was in the Benton County Home Guard, may have fought at The Battle of Cole Camp, and is buried in town.

The great part of this news is that Jean will share a copy of the picture, and the information. This means we'll get to do some original, primary source research, on the fly, in Cole Camp, hopefully with the help of Bob Owens. It is just great when people share unselfishly and give of themselves. Thanks again Jean.

- * You are not obligated to dine at Der Essen Platz. We'll have pricing and meal info next week at the Round Table meeting for this eatery. However, there is nothing wrong in bringing a sack lunch if you so choose. In fact, everyone should probably bring snacks, coolers with drinks, and elephant trunks for the day's activities.

Circumventing Cole Camp posed little problem because of the network of trails south of town, which were probably all considered part of the Duroc Road net.



Cole Camp



One of two "mass graves" in the area, reportedly containing the bodies of about one hundred and seven Union Home Guards. At Union Cemetery, ninety are reportedly buried and seventeen are reported buried at Immanuel (Monsees) Lutheran Cemetery. Documentation to verify these graves or the number of bodies in them has not been found as of this time, nor do these numbers coincide with other reports, leaving open the questions of just who and how many are buried in these graves. The answer to these questions must await future research.

Brian Smarker, with occasional assistance from John Martin, presented our March Round Table program concerning the unmarked Union soldier graves at Pisagh cemetery, near Excelsior Springs.

Brian spoke of the 2nd Colorado soldiers buried at Pisgah, whose deaths were the result from action at The Battle of Fredericksburg, near the cemetery.

Efforts are underway by the Sons of Union Veterans to mark the location of the burials with a memorial. An installation event is tentatively scheduled for July.

The highlight of the presentation though, was the offer of a chunk of red granite, from Rex Stark. Mr. Stark had recently purchased the block of stone and offered it to the Sons of Union Veterans for the Pisgah Cemetery memorial.

We'll be sure to keep in touch on this development. Thank you to Brian Smarker and John Martin, and thank you to Rex Stark.

Little Blue Memorial Wall

We've got free land, and the promise of free excavating and masonry construction work. All we need now are materials!

Wow, so much has happened recently concerning the Little Blue Memorial Wall Project! I sense some real momentum starting to build but we still need you, the community, to help.

If you'll recall, this writer had observed a picture of a new Memorial Wall commemorating the Battle of Kinston, in North Carolina. Using this image as a starting point for discussion, we mulled over the idea of constructing a similar structure at The Little Blue Battlefield, both at Guardians meetings and Round Table meetings.

Below is an outline of the progress on this project, accompanied by three Memorial Wall sketches:

- * On March 25, Beverly Shaw, Don Moorehead and I met with Jackson County Park officials. They have contributed a portion of their land (namely the east bank of the Little Blue River, just south of the current 24 Highway bridges at Ripley Junction, in the Little Blue Trace Park) for construction of The Little Blue Memorial Wall! Many thanks to Ron Fuhrken and Bruce Wilke of Jackson County Parks for their contribution.
- * We'll need to make the structure as maintenance free as possible.
- * We'll need to build the wall on a larger scale than that of the Kinston model.
- * We've been given transportation access for trucks and vehicles during the construction phase.
- * We'll probably need to make the wall out of masonry material.
- * We'll probably use metal letters which will roughly contain the following info:

Civil War Battle Site Price's Raid Battle of The Little Blue October 21, 22, 1864

* We'll need to sign a Memorandum of Agreement with the County detailing any future obligations. * Mark Christianson, local mason, has agreed to help with excavating and masonry work.

Now begins the real fun: the designing, acquisition of materials and construction. Right now, taking into account the guidelines above, the sky is the limit on creativity. Please contribute your thoughts! Let's make this a community project! We'll be talking about this at future Guardian and Round Table meetings.

In the meantime, consider the accompanying drawings, submitted by Jay Bredwell, Dennis Myers, and Mark Swanson. Drafters, engineers, and others please submit your drawings for review. Lets piggyback off each other to come up with something real unique to honor the brave fighters at The Little Blue.






