#### President's Letter

I don't know how many of you have shared this story of a piece of my life. At one time in the past I was a lay speaker in the Methodist Church. At one time I was filling the pulpit about 26 times a year. I tell you that to tell you this. One time many years ago the Bible verse I was to speak upon was the one with the disciples in the boat on the Sea of Galilee with the wind blowing strongly and Jesus appeared to them walking on the water. As the story unfolds, Peter walks on water to meet Jesus when the wind begins to blow and he becomes afraid and sinks. I tell you that to tell you this. To illustrate the fury of a storm at sea, I utilized the storm scene from Herman Wouk's *The Caine Mutiny*. The best thing I can tell you is that the description was so well done, you can feel the sweat and fear in the cabin. Get the book and read the passage; I know you will agree.

I tell you that to tell you this. As most of you know my dad and uncle served on the same ship in the World War II Navy. On that Sunday a long time ago as I told the story of the storm at sea, I looked out into the church pews and saw my uncle with tears streaming down his face. I wondered then what I had said to bring forth this reaction. Sometime later I finally got the courage to ask my uncle why. He related this story.

On one of the 18 crossings of the Atlantic, on convoy escort duty, their ship (USS Quick) encounter a North Atlantic winter storm off the coast of Newfoundland. The sea was so rough and heavy the captain had great difficulty keeping the ship turned into the wind, the safest way to handle the heavy wave action. Unfortunately, one large wave hit the ship perpendicular to its length, almost causing the ship to roll and end upside down. My uncle said he was sure he was going to die. The fear he had on that day came back to him as I told my story. My dad and uncle were 19 and 17 when they joined. They were two Midwest Illinois farmers who had never seen a body of water any bigger than a farm pond and were facing death that day, maybe for the first time.

Were they brave or acted bravely that day? I don't really know. Their act of bravery really occurred they day they went to the Navy recruiting office. They, like so many others before them and so many others after, did a truly selfless act that day. They decided to place their lives in danger so others could live lives with freedom of speech, freedom of worship, freedom of want and freedom from fear. Young men and women are still doing this today. Thank them. Don't let time go by and end up never saying "thank you." It's a regret I live with. VETERAN'S DAY, NOVEMBER 11<sup>th</sup>.

Since this will be the last *Border Star* of the year please have a Happy Thanksgiving and a Merry Christmas. Thank you for all the support you have given me and the Round Table.

Thank you to **Mike Calvert** who shared some of his library with the Round Table for our silent auction in October and to all the buyers who helped raise \$176 which was deposited to the Sonny Wells Little Blue Battlefield account to help the matching funds we will use in our grant application to the DAR for revising and reprinting our original "Monuments" book. Books not sold the night of our meeting were scooped up by **Paul Bond** who has been so generous with us in the past for donating his books to our silent auction. Paul has agreed to stand for election as a new board member.

We were very honored to have a private tour of the City of Lexington and the historical museum on October 15, 2016. Mike Calvert was introduced to **Don Coen**, our guide, through his daughter whom Mike works with. Don was very engaging and

generous with his time. Now we all want to go back and do one of the driving or walking tours as outlined in the visitor guide he gave us.

The "50 year ago" column in the Examiner in October noted the donation of the original manuscript of *Another Spring* by **Louela Grace Erdman** to the Jackson County Historical Society because of all the help she received from Mayme Piper its archivist. It's the story about victims of Order No. 11.

The "100 year ago" column in October also cited a list compiled by **Dr. N.H. Gaines** of the six men still living at the Confederate home at Higginsville who had a combined age of 549. He thinks this is a record for any Home or community anywhere.

In case you like to book your historical tours way in advance, you might be interested in the day trip to **Fort Leavenworth, Kansas** presented by the **Civil War Round Table of Kansas City for April 22, 2017**. It's very difficult to access Fort Leavenworth unless you have an escort, and this sounds like a comprehensive tour. The cost is \$30 for the bus tour and lunch at the Army Dining Facility (mess hall) on post is \$5.55 per person which must be paid in cash. Call Beverly Shaw at (816) 225-7944 for information.

We found on our trip to Lexington, MO that the Battle of Lexington State Historic Site and the historic Anderson House are real treasures in Lafayette County. Our late member, Dr. Gerald Anderson, claimed kin to the Anderson family. We also learned that the longtime Administrator of the site, Janae Fuller, has retired.

The Kansas City *Star* of October 16, 2016 revealed that **David Hawley** and his partners are planning to excavate another lost steamboat near Malta Bend, Missouri. However with the additional artifacts from the *Malta*, it becomes more imperative that the Steamboat *Arabia* museum find larger quarters. We have had speakers for the Round Table who brought sample artifacts from the *Arabia*.

Also in the October 16<sup>th</sup> issue of the *Star* there was a supplement called "Heroes." How wonderful it was to read something in the newspaper that was uplifting. One of the heroes was Wayne Miner, an

African American soldier in World War I. The historian who supplied information for this exciting story was **Joelouis Mattox** who is pictured at a meeting of the Wayne Miner Post of the American Legion. Joe also researches the role of Black soldiers in the Civil War, both Federal and Confederate, and gives programs at the Battle of Westport Museum, Communiversity, and the Watkins Cultural Center.

The fall issue of *Missouri Resources* magazine had a good article about "Top Spots for Learning about Missouri State History." One is the First Missouri State Capitol State Historic Site in St. Charles, MO. First granted statehood on August 10, 1821, we will soon be celebrating our bicentennial in 2021. The "City of Jefferson" was chosen as a permanent capital, but until it could be built, the state government was located in St. Charles, MO. Our present capitol in Jefferson City is actually the third building to stand there on the banks of the Missouri River. The previous ones were destroyed by fire. If you visit the capitol, be sure to take a guided tour and see the displays of the Missouri State Museum on the first floor.

**Don Moorehead** and **Vonda Clark** are leaving the board for health reasons and we want to thank them for their many contributions, especially the research and pictures for our latest "Monuments" book. Don was the navigator and Vonda took the pictures, and they were supported by Don's late wife, **Kathy.**

The Examiner showed a smiling **Steve Noll**, Executive Director of the Jackson County Historical Society, on the cover of the paper on October 22, 2016. Steve is a collaborator with Bruce Mathews on a new book *Kansas City: Our Collective Memories*. Steve says, "This book was my idea basically to justify a houseful of stuff." In the photo there is a display case with some Independence artifacts: Polly Pop bottles, which was a locally made soda now being revived. Probably the most collected historical artifacts in Kansas City are the Priests of Pallas souvenirs of this major festival for

a quarter of a century. The parade was said some years to attract 500,000 people. It ran from 1887 to 1912. Beverly Shaw has a Priests of Pallas souvenir figure which she inherited from an elderly friend in Westport.

We are glad to report that **Ruth Payne** had a wonderful time with her family when they visited Yellowstone National Park on the centennial of the National Park Service. She brought back a beautiful note card showing an Old Faithful Sunset.

We are looking forward to the dedication of the improvements at Jackson County's **Salem Park** on 24 Highway at Blue Mills Road sometime in early December. Our low profile marker of the Battle of the Little Blue is a part of the newly configured markers there to commemorate the Santa Fe Trail going through Missouri.

Our long distance members from Los Angeles, **Orven Schanzer and Lisa Gilman**, are visiting Kansas City and Independence from late October until November 4<sup>th</sup>. They pick a different historical area to visit and probably know more about local history than the natives. Lisa is also a "clipper" and sends interesting articles from the L.A. *Times*.

One was about the "New Confederate flag rule." Rep. Jared Huffman (D-San Rafael) spoke on Capitol Hill in June during a protest against Confederate symbolism on the Mississippi flag. Apparently the Department of Veterans Affairs is changing its policy on displaying the Confederate flag. It will be prohibited from being flown on any permanent flag pole at a national cemetery. It will continue to allow private organizations to display the flag on individual Confederate soldiers' graves on certain days. It can also still be displayed at certain ceremonies and at private burials taking place at national cemeteries.
