Our June 12th meeting will be a work session. We will be putting the final touches on the book Civil War Monuments and Memorials in the Greater Kansas City Area.

Each table of 3 or 4 people will be given two pages to work with. Correct, eliminate or add to the wording and pick the best two pictures of those monuments.

When these two pages are done, there will be two more, until all 66 pages are done. The finished product will then go to Harmony Printing where the finish work will begin.

The Table of Contents, the Index and additional notes will be finished once the text is complete. Only 120 copies will be printed. Each Round Table member will get a book (one per family), Mid-Continent Library will get 3 for distribution, one for Geneology and one for Reference, Johnson County Library, Wyandotte County Historical Society, Johnson County Historical Society, Jackson County Historical Society, Clay County Archives will get a book. Plus, school librarys in the 5 county area who requests one will get it. (Reserving 50)

It is important that we get this job done. Please be present and contribute to the effort.

About the Logo on the Memorial Day Program

Several asked about the logo which I had on the inside cover of the Memorial Day program.

The logo shows a soldier and a young boy with a bugle standing with a flag which is swirling around them. The words below the etching are...

"Poor is the nation which has no heroes. Shameful is the nation that has them and forgets".

This is the logo I always have on the program at a Medal of Honor Memorial marker placement, particularily if the current grave marker has no mention of military service, no mention of the Medal of Honor, or the grave was unmarked.

I even use it on my official Medal of Honor Historical Society letterhead and on all newsreleases.

This logo is considered to be the "unofficial" logo of the MOHHS, since it would take an act of Congress to be the "Official" logo.

As of January 2000, it is estimated there are 100 million Civil War descendants. Is it any wonder there is so much interest in this very tragic time in our nations History.

Below are listed some of the sources which can be used to help people locate their Civil War families. Try to get a name, middle initial and unit of service as a start, then whereever the trail leads, follow. Remember...Don't give up, the information you are seeking is out there someplace.

Dwyers Compendium of Records of the War of Rebellion by Frederick H. Dwyer, Vol. 3, Regimental Histories, gives names and dates of all actions of each Federal unit.

Records are broken down by state and type of unit. Also has breakdown of casualties

Missouri Sketch Book by Clifton C. Odom

@1983, Kelly Press, Columbia, Mo. Day-by-day diary of the battles and skirmishes in Missouri, pgs 146-155.

Lots of Drawings of Civil War notables. Many sources listed in Bibliography.

Check the prison and hospital lists, if available, including the death lists.

Don't forget...Military Pensions, Union Veterans started in 1866 in Missouri.

Confederates started receiving Mo. State pensions on July 1, 1913, 47 years later.

Check Military Records Center of National Archives for any separation papers. Gives unit, date of discharge, description, sometimes more.

Don't forget the Family History Library in Salt Lake City.

Good hunting and remember...Don't give up.

So, What else is new?

Some of Richard Abbott's barn wood framed photos are showing up around the area. The Clay County Savings and Loan office in Kearney hung one of the reward posters, the one about the robbery of the Clay County Savings Association in February of 1866, in their lobby.

When John Davis, the CEO of CCS&L, saw it he wanted one for his office. So I picked out a matched pair, the wanted poster and the 1864 Jesse photo, and delivered them to his. John was very pleased with the set.

And there is a barber shop in Kearney which has a couple of Richard's frames hanging in it also.

Some of Richard's bird houses, all painted up by Rosella Moritz of Liberty, have ended up in Minnesota.

Some of Rosella's kin was down a couple of weeks back and took a whole trunk load of houses back with them to give one to each of the nephews and nieces.

Donna Warren has donated a book to our ever growing collection, one which will be of interest to many. It is an autobiography by Charles Windolph about his time in the 7th Cavalry during the Indian Campaigns, including details of his actions on a point near the Little Big Horn massacre site which protected the water hole.

Windolph was one of 24 who received a Medal of Honor for their actions in trying to rescue Custer. He died in March 1950. age 99.

A bus leaves Saturday morning, June 8, for a two day trip to visit museums, a restored frontier village, a 52 room colonial mansion, ride a restored 1880's train, and tour a piece of old trail history.

I am also looking at a 5 day tour for this October which will include a Pony Express Station, Chimney Rock, Scott's Bluff, Front Street in Ogalala and old Fort Laramie.
