Looking Ahead! April 14, 1999

Whitman will tell about the influence of the Civil War (he was a wound dresser and nurse) and the assassination of Lincoln on his work. He will also talk about westward expansion, including his trip through Missouri to the Rockies.

May 8, 1999

In conjunction with "The Buck Stops Here" celebration and Preservation Week 1999, the Independence Heritage Commission and the Civil War Round Table of Western Missouri will sponsor a tour of sites associated with the Civil War battle at the Little Blue, a part of General Sterling Price's 1864 raid in Missouri. Tours begin outside the 1859 Jail Museum (217 N. Main Street) at 10:30 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, May 8, 1999.

The cost will be \$1.00. Transportation will be provided; however, seating is limited, so feel free to call ahead and reserve a seat. The tour is approximately two hours in length and will include visits at the following sites:

- Little Blue Park and battle scenario at battlefield plaque
- Five Generals Meeting site. En route see old spring and old trail markings
- Moonlight's position on Sibley Road
- Jackman's Charge on Moonlight site
- Shelby's Hospital Site
- Shelby's Second Charge Site
- Oregon Trail/Battle Line marker
- St. Mary's Massacre Site including story of the massacre

Designer's Showhouse

The Civil War Round Table of Western Missouri has been a participating group at the Designers' Showhouse for the last four years. Designers' Showhouse is a fund-raiser for the Kansas City Symphony and youth concerts. It's an annual tour of a large house which has been decorated by area designers.

In addition, there is a boutique, tea room, and special events. Our job as docents is to act as hosts in various design areas for a three hour period from 5:00 PM to 8:00 PM on Thursday, May 13, 1999. It's okay if you can't get there right on the dot of 5:00 PM as long as some of us can go early to relieve the docents who have worked during the afternoon.

Participation gives us the chance to see a beautifully decorated home (a \$10 value), as well as meet some nice people who tour the house and help the Kansas City

Symphony at the same time. Our group is acknowledged in the official program book.

The 30th annual Designers' Showhouse is located at 1055 W. 55th Street, Kansas City, Missouri (Ward Parkway and 55th on the southeast corner). It was built in 1919 by George Foster, treasurer of the Foster Lumber Company. It has 8,000 square feet of living area and a carriage house. This same house was the 2nd annual Designers' Showhouse 28 years ago. At that time it was painted white, but the present owner has exposed the blond brick and added a wall of matching brick with alcoves sheltering classic women's statuary.

Historic Preservation Week May 8

Heritage Salute June 4th, 5th, 6th

Although Independence was founded in 1827, it was not incorporated as a city until

1849. A citywide celebration will take place called Heritage Salute. Many activities are planned in conjunction with this event: pops concert, conversations and pictures with Harry and Bess Truman, Frank James court trial, jail break, swing band contest, dance at the Memorial Building, walking tours, antique cars, Civil War and pioneer encampments, Quantrill society display, historical interpreters, legacy of Hiram Young, and other events including the Vaile Strawberry festival.

The CWRT is planning to be involved in some way in this event.

Wilson's Creek National Battlefield

Wilson's Creek National Battlefield will sponsor a major seminar on the history of the Missouri State Guard. (See calendar). This seminar has been organized to examine the critical role of the Missouri State Guard in the Civil War west of the Mississippi River. Organized in the spring of 1861 to oppose Federal forces, the State Guard participated in a number of major battles, such as Boonville, Carthage, Athens, Wilson's Creek and Lexington in Missouri and Pea Ridge in Arkansas. Although the majority of the Guardsmen wore civilian clothing and were armed with civilian weapons, they fought bravely in defense of their state.

The seminar will bring together some of the most respected scholars in this field. A unique opportunity to learn more about one of the most important but forgotten military organizations in existence during the Civil War.

Fred L. Lee died Dec. 29, 1998 at the age of 63, after suffering a heart attack. Fred was a long-time historian and author. His journalism and professionalism will be missed by all of those who knew him best.

CENSUS OF SLAVES, THEIR OWNERS AND "FREE COLORED": 1850 AND 1860

a Book Review by Faye Dennison

This book is the second volume in the series: <u>Jackson County in</u> <u>Black and White</u> compiled by Annette W. Curtis.

This volume concerns Jabez Smith, his slaves, his plantations, his estate, guardianships of two of his heirs and some genealogical information about both the white and black families. This volume includes transcriptions of the guardianship records of two minor heirs, Jabez Smith Jr. And John T. Smith, in addition to records of the estate of Jabez Smith. Slaves given to each heir are named.

In addition, the death of Jabez Smith Jr. Produced more records, including the division of his share of the slaves with more lists of names in family groups. Births and deaths are noted. Everything purchased for the use of the slaves of John T. Smith over a period

of several years is listed. The principal time span is 1855 to 1895. Much material is here for both scholarly and family researchers to analyze.

This second volume is titled: <u>Jackson County, Missouri in Black and White: Volume 2 - Jabez Smith: His Slaves, Plantations, Estate and Heirs.</u> This volume is 552 pages in length; illustrated in black and white. Name and subject indexing. Available at Bruce R. Watkins Cultural Heritage Center. (Price \$34.95 plus \$3.75 per book for postage & handling.)

Price for Volume I only through the Heritage Center is \$14.95 plus postage. It is believed that the Mid-Continent Library carries the book in Lee's Summit.

"Vandals struck Austin Cemetery Jan. 8 overturning nearly 20 gravestones and flower vases. The sheriff's department report indicated there are no suspects yet. The Austin Cemetery Association is offering a \$100 reward for information leading to an arrest in the case and said the stones will likely have to remain on the ground until spring due to wet conditions..."

More recently vandals struck the Woodlawn Cemetery in Independence on Noland Road. And once again damage was done to numerous stones in the cemetery.
