President's Letter

The National Trust for Historic Preservation in the United States defines heritage tourism as "traveling to experience the places, artifacts and activities that authentically represent the stories and people of the past" and "heritage tourism can include cultural, historic and natural resources" -Julie Payne, American Bus Association "The Insider" December 30, 2018

Maybe it's because I've spent so much time over the last few months researching the early merchants of Independence, or maybe it's because the Round Table is organizing a trip to the Battles of Pea Ridge and Prairie Grove, whichever is the reason, the result has been my thinking about Heritage Tourism.

I'm back on my cultural tourism soapbox because I've been reading in the local papers about the need for more industry in Independence. You and I both know that when a talking head speaks on industry, they're talking about the bricks and mortar kind. The building of factories is the usual number one idea put forth. Our local leaders are missing the number one industry in Independence – Heritage Tourism. We're sitting on a gold mine. Within Independence we have presidential history, trails history, Civil War history, Mormon history, African American history, Native American history, architectural history and World War II home front history, just to name a few histories. Yet little is done to promote this heritage. We don't need another factory; we need to promote the industry we have. We don't need another tax break to lure an industry. By the way a tax break undermines our Government's ability to provide for our basic needs of safety, growing neighborhoods, reliable utilities and jobs. We need leadership that promotes that which we have an abundance of – History.

Heritage tourism is considered one of the fastest-growing segments in the industry and equates to a \$171 billion annual spend. Eighty-one percent of U.S. tourists are considered "cultural tourists," and 56 percent of the U.S. population indicated it included at least one cultural, arts, historic or heritage activity or event while on a trip in the past year. Cultural tourists spend more and stay longer: Average spend is 60 percent more at approximately \$1,319 per trip, as compared to \$820 for the traditional, domestic leisure traveler. Cultural tourists take 3.6 trips vs. 3.4 trips annually.

PS I'm talking about some else's money being spent in our town. Win – Win.

PSS The Round Table is organizing a trip in April to The Battle of Pea Ridge and The Battle of Prairie Grove. Heritage Tourism--imagine that.

Battle of Pea Ridge (Arkansas)

On March 7 and 8, 1862, the 10,500-man Union Army of the Southwest and the 16,200-man Confederate Army of the West met in combat at two separate battlefields, Leetown and Elkhorn Tavern, on the gently rolling plain called Pea Ridge. The Battle of Leetown ended after the death of two Confederate generals on March 7, while the battle of Elkhorn Tavern continued until the Confederates ran out of ammunition on March 8. The decisive Union victory ensured that Missouri would remain in Federal control and paved the way for Grant's Vicksburg campaign.

News about Members and Friends

Crosby Kemper III, former executive director of the Kansas City Public Library, was confirmed by the Senate in January to become director of the Museum and Library Services in Washington, D. C.

Independent scholar, **Nancy Ehrlich** from Independence, MO will be presenting a talk at the Missouri Conference on History in St. Louis in March. Her topic is "The Process Used in the Creation of a Catalog of Missouri Presbyterian Churches, 1805-2020."

We lost two Civil War scholars and authors in 2019. **James I. "Bud" Robertson** served as executive director of the U. S. Civil War Centennial Commission in the early '60s. He wrote what many call the definitive work on "Stonewall" Jackson. He also delivered more than 350 radio essays that aired weekly for nearly 15 years on National Public Radio. He was the voice for reason, patience, and understanding.

William McFeely died at age 89 in December, 2019. He won the Pulitzer for his biography of Ulysses S. Grant and was also known for advancing the field of black history through his biography of Frederick Douglass, and helped establish Yale's black studies department.

The Maryland State House now has new bronzes of two of the state's famous black historical figures—**Harriet Tubman and Frederick Douglass.** They were unveiled in the Old House Chamber where slavery was abolished in Maryland in 1864.

Elizabeth Varon from the University of Virginia has a new book called *Armies of Deliverance: A New History of the Civil War* named one of the ten best nonfiction books of 2019 by *The Wall Street Journal.* She weaves military developments with electoral politics and emancipation.
