President's Letter

Most of you are aware that during my working career as a project manager I spent a lot of time out of town. I was in Houston, TX for 6 months, Atlanta, GA for 2 months, Front Royal, VA for 9 months and Boston, MA for 18 months to name some of the places. Looking back, I would have to admit that I did enjoy the opportunity these stays afforded me to visit and explore the local history sites. I could spend hours (some of you would say I already have) recounting my adventures. But that is not what this writing is about. This story is not about the "going to "but the "coming to."

I want you to ask yourself: when you returned to your starting point, how did you know you were there? Specifically, how did you know you were home? I can hear you saying, I was at my house. I know we know when we are home because of a dwelling, but what tells you, you are in the right place? Is it a street, a tree or a statue? My touchstone for being home is two buildings. The Jackson County Independence Courthouse and the H.S. Truman Home. The next time you are out and about look back towards the Independence Square, if the atmospheric conditions are favorable and you have line of sight, you will see the Courthouse bell tower from as far away as 8 miles. When I returned home from my travels, that bell tower always meant just 8 miles to home. Returning home when I came to the intersection of Truman Road and Delaware Street, and saw the Truman Home, I knew I was 2 blocks from home. Being close to home was and is always a warm feeling. As I was writing this, I began to think of the Civil War soldiers who returned home.

The numbers are approximate, but statistics will say that 3 million soldiers served and 800,000 died during the Civil War. Quick math says that 2.2 million soldiers returned to their home after the war ended. I wonder what they used to mark their being home. Probably not much different than you and I today. What would happen if their landmark wasn't there? We know that the probability was very small of returning to a war-ravaged hometown and finding your landmark. Your home may be destroyed. Your family no longer there or near there. How would you react? Would you give up or start and continue your search until you found home? With all that you held in your heart that made you survive gone, do you or can you ever find home again? Just something to ponder. Returning home never grows old.

Continue to the left and go north on Bass Pro Drive to circle the Bass Pro Shop again until you come to the park round-a-bout. To leave the park, exit the parking lot and keep to your left to take Bluff Drive south to intersect with Bass Pro Drive at the round-a-bout. Take a right to go back to 40 Highway. Waterfall Park can also be accessed from Lee's Summit Road by taking Bass Pro Drive east. It is across from the south Adair Park entrance (Girls' Softball Park).
