#### **President's Letter**

I have just finished reading *The Siege of Vicksburg* by Timothy B. Smith. This book is one third of a trilogy on the campaign to capture Vicksburg, Mississippi 1862-1863. All books are well written and are worthy of being read. In the Siege, Smith writes about all the usual things that must be included in any work related to a history of the Civil War. He tells the reader about the personalities, the troops and the actions related to the battles. The one thing that stands out in The Siege is the effect on the civilians of Vicksburg. Smith writes of their many trials from the daily bombardment and dodging exploding shells to the near starvation when the siege ended on July 4, 1863. This started me thinking about the civilian population during the Civil War and what were the trials they faced.

Inflation – This is a story of two approaches to funding the war. The north chose to borrow money, sell bonds, enact an income tax and print more money. This led to an inflation rate of approximately 80%. The Confederacy chose not to raise taxes. They did sell bonds and printed money without it being backed by gold or silver. The inflation rate in the south was about 9000%. This hyperinflation led to the April 2, 1863 bread riot in Richmond, VA. Hungry women took to the streets demanding help. The governor refused any help. The women attacked businesses primarily looking for food. Finally, troops were deployed to quell the riot. In 1860 a barrel of flour in the south cost \$3.00 and by 1863 \$275.00.

Death – Civilian death in particular. Historians have established there could have been as many as 130,000 civilian deaths during the war. Most of this number was from disease. However, there are deaths caused by direct military action. At Vicksburg as many as dozen civilians were killed, including children with less than 50 wounded. At Fredericksburg as little as 5 were killed. At Gettysburg one. How many were killed in our area is known only to God.

The other trials that face the civilian population during the Civil War would include loss of home, loss of business, crops destroyed, deforestation, the aftermath of battle and loss of family. I encourage you to do your own study. There is one conclusion to draw; that war is not controllable. Anything and anyone in the path of combatants will suffer. There is an African proverb that says:

#### "WHEN ELEPHANTS FIGHT, IT IS THE GRASS THAT SUFFERS"

It is the end of another year and many, many thank you's are in order. First, thanks to all who attend our monthly meetings, without you, well there's no meeting. Second, thank you to all who have served on the board, without you and your input this would be a rudderless ship. Third, a big thank you to Barb Wormington, Pat Gradwohl, and Joyce Gillespie as they step down from the board. Fourth, thank you to the board members who agreed to serve another year and also to take on some new responsibilities. Here's to a new year and the pursuit of knowledge and understanding of the seminal event in our nation's history.

Good news about the **Confederate Memorial Friends Association**. Jim Beckner is the new President of the group which plans the Confederate Memorial Day programming the first Saturday of June each year at the Confederate Memorial State Historic Site at Higginsville, MO. They are also co-sponsoring a Christmas Concert on December 11, 2022 at the Chapel.

We have also received word that the **Sultana Disaster Museum** at Marion, Arkansas is fundraising for a permanent museum. On April 27, 1865 the Mississippi steamboat *Sultana* exploded her boilers when she was seven miles above the town of Memphis, Tennessee. She was carrying 2,130 people, including 1,953 recently released Union prisoners of war. After five hours of horror, the *Sultana* sank near present day Marion, AR. 1,169 people perished, making it the worst maritime disaster in American history.
