News About Members and Friends

We look forward to **Tom Rafiner's** research on the effect of Order No. 11 on **Bates County**. He believes the impact there was far deeper than other counties and that Bates County was indeed forever changed. **The Bates County Historical Society** also reports that they were able to sell a dog-trot style log cabin which has been in storage since it came from Licking, Missouri. It was bought immediately after a flyer was posted. They understand that it is going to be reconstructed at **Arrow Rock** to become part of the Santa Fe Trail attraction.

Tom Beard, the sculptor of the Pioneer Park statues at Westport Road and Broadway in Kansas City, would like to sell a Springfield Rifle, 1863 for \$1,000. The sale also includes complete original sites: closeup-300 to 500 yards; tulip ramrod, brown patina finish; miniball moldmaker; leather sling; wrench to remove nipples; 2 boxes of caps for end of nipples; an original nipple and several modern ones. Vickie Beck should be congratulated for bringing the fate of this cemetery to our attention. They both appreciate the support of all the historical groups who participated.

The Round Table would like to thank the *Examiner* for its support of Civil War history in the newspaper through its columnists such as David Jackson and Ted Stillwell ("Order No. 11") and the staff writers such as Frank Haight ("Duo working to rescue local pioneer cemetery") and **Jeff Fox** ("Re-enactment group brings history to life"). Not to be forgotten is Jillayne Ritchie who researches the 50/100 Years Ago column. Her 50 years ago column on August 10, 2013 showed that Brig. Gen. John Taylor Hughes, who was killed in the victorious Confederate attack which he led on Independence Aug. 11, 1862, was honored more than a century later with a monument bearing his full military rank. The grave is in Woodlawn Cemetery. Her 100 years ago column on June 29, 2013 gave the recipe for Jeff Davis Pie furnished by Mrs. C. R. Hudspeth of Buckner, Missouri.

Our friends in California (**Lisa and Uncle**) discovered recently that the **Hangar** company that continues to manufacture orthotic equipment to this day was started by J. E. Hangar, the first Confederate soldier wounded in 1861. His leg was amputated and not being satisfied with his wooden peg, he stayed in his room for three months designing a more humane attachment. Uncle is being fitted for a new ankle/foot orthotic.

Congratulations to the **Jackson County Historical Society** for its annual gala on September 6, 2013, when the evening begins with a reception and tour of the Jackson County Historic Truman Courthouse and Art Museum. The dinner speaker is **Clifton Truman Daniel.**

We have another California connection to the Round Table through an E-Mail from **John Hart**, the greatgrandson of **John Benson Hart**, who served in the Eleventh Kansas Cavalry under **General Blunt**. Late in life JBH dictated a fascinating memoir of his campaign during the Battle of Westport. John plans to visit Missouri to follow his ancestor's "hoofprints." He says that his ancestor writes vividly of the Battle of the Little Blue. John hopes to do some writing based on the memoir and looks forward to seeing the actual locations.

The Kansas City Star continues its coverage of local Civil War history. Brian Burnes had a book review of James Muehlberger's new book called The Lost Cause: The Trials of Frank and Jesse James on July 7, 2013. In the August 15 Events section Darryl Levings highlighted the various Lawrence Raid events in his column called "Quantrill Remembered." In the Star Magazine of August 18, 2013, Cindy Hoedel interviewed Tony Mullis of the Command and Staff College at Fort Leavenworth on the question: Was Quantrill a Villain or a Hero? On August 10, 2013 Mara Rose Williams had a front-page article called "Fighting to preserve a crumbling history" about the many historical buildings at risk in Lexington, Missouri. There were many quotes from our late friend Roger **Slusher** whose last request was that a small pre-Civil War building – possibly former slave quarters – be preserved.

In Kentucky there is a project called the Civil War Governors of Kentucky, Digital Documentary Edition. They are researching the five Kentucky Civil War governors, three Union (Beriah Magoffin, James F. Robinson, and Thomas E. Bramlette) and the two provisional Confederate governors (George W. Johnson and Richard Hawes.) What they are seeking are manuscripts or printed materials written by any of them, documents addressed to a governor, documents endorsed by a governor, documents written by a secretary or assistant but signed by a governor, and documents reporting a governor's words such as speeches printed in newspapers. "I will tell you," said General Scott. "The men who took us into Mexico City are the same men who are keeping us out of Richmond." -Confederate Veteran Magazine, September, 1913.

We are sorry to report that another trails marker in Independence has been vandalized at the McCoy Park. **Sharon Snyder** who lives in the McCoy Neighborhood reported that a low profile marker was ripped from its metal frame and left in the grass. This is in addition to the statue stolen from the National Frontier Trails Museum and destroyed for its metal content.
