President's Letter

After visiting the battlefields last summer I was struck by the number of times that Missouri troops found themselves on both sides of the battle line. Let's take a look at the 2nd Battle of Corinth. On October 3, 1862 at Battery F and the White House, the Missouri Confederate Troops of: Green (4th, 6th, Guibor's Batt, Landis' Batt), Gates (2nd,3rd,5th, Wade's Batt), Colbert (Clark's Batt, St. Louis Batt), Moore (Bledsoe's Batt) vs. Missouri Union Troops of: Baldwin(4th, 1st MO Artillery Batt D), McArthur (21st), Mower (11th), Sullivan (10th, 24th, Holmes' Batt), Buford (26th, 1st MO Artillery Batt M). Match-ups also occurred on October 4th at Battery Powell and Battery Robinett. Space will not allow a description of the battle, so you will have to do your own research. A caveat needs to be inserted here. The designation of the troops may indicate a Missouri origin, but if you look a little further you will also find that the men may well have been native to another state. Such as the 11th MO Volunteer Infantry. Nine of the ten companies were made up with the majority of the men coming from Illinois. I don't know that this is typical or atypical for all Missouri troops, however.

The Missouri troops that fought each other were not necessarily brothers who had the same father and mother. They were brothers in arms fighting for a cause they saw as right and worth giving one's life for. They may have even known someone across the line. I sit today and wonder what they may have been thinking knowing that in a short time they may have to kill a boyhood friend. How sad to think that you may be the cause of friend's death and making a widow of his bride and orphans of his children.

I believe Missouri, while not the only state that had troops on both sides, was the only state that had troops on both sides and they fought each other. Again, not with a great amount of research I would say that Kentucky did not and Maryland did not (West Virginia vs. Virginia troops don't count). The Civil War battles were often times fought by men who had very good knowledge of the opposing troops especially in our state of Missouri.

Bonus question: What Missouri troops fought in Virginia? Where? When? Commander?

This and That

"Ripley's Believe It or Not!" says that during the U. S. Civil War, the state of Missouri sent 39 regiments to fight -17 for the south and 22 for the north.

Flags of the Irish Regiments: Federal infantry regiments carried Regimental Colors with the American eagle on a blue field or the state coat of arms on a blue field. While the regiments of the Irish Brigade were issued such colors, they preferred to keep them cased while they unfurled a flag of emerald green, which made them stand out on the battlefields.

U. S. Postal Service Commemorates 150 Civil War Anniversary: The second of a series of Forever Stamps that pay tribute to the American Civil War show the Battle of New Orleans, the first significant achievement of the U. S. Navy in the war, and the Battle of Antietam, which marked the bloodiest day of the war.

Art director Phil Jordan created the stamps using images of Civil War battles. The Battle of New Orleans stamp is a reproduction of an 1862 colored lithograph by Currier & Ives titled "The Splendid Naval Triumph on the Mississippi, April 24, 1862." It depicts Admiral David G. Farragut's fleet passing Fort Jackson and Fort St. Phillip on the way to New Orleans.

The Battle of Antietam stamp is a reproduction of an 1887 painting by Thure de Thulstrup. The painting was one of a series of popular prints commissioned in the 1880's by Boston publisher Louis Prang & Co. to commemorate the Civil War.
